All incoming students who are admitted to Union and have a 3.5 GPA or a 28 on the ACT will be invited to apply to the General Honors program. Transfer students, current Union students, and incoming freshmen who do not meet this criterion but think they are up to the challenge of Honors work are also welcome to apply.
